DR. STRAUSS' REFERENCE.

At the Jewish Synagogue, Bowland Street, at the close of the weekly Sabbath service, this morning, the Rev. Dr. Strauss made a touching allusion to the death of the King.

Dr. Strauss said it was a great calamity that such an excellent King should have been taken away at a comparatively early age. King Edward was without doubt the best King that England ever possessed on account of his humanity, his suavity, and his untiring efforts in the cause of peace, and it was only fitting that his name should go down to history as Edward the Peacemaker

Dr. Strauss also alluded to the efforts of the King in helping literature, science, and culture. His excellent Consort, Queen Alexandra, had, said Dr. Strauss lost an excellent husband, and his children a very dear, loving father.

At the conclusion of the service the organist (M:ss Nellie Straues) played Chopin's "Funeral March."
